3. Profile of skills and competences

The holder of this document has the competence to undertake product development, plan, carry out, assess and document projects and tasks relating to Sami clothing, tools, equipment, handicrafts and applied art, with special emphasis on one of the following areas: – textile weaving/sewing/braiding – preparing nappa leather and fur hides – drawing, twisting and sewing tin wires – sewing pearl embroideries – weaving braids – horn and bone – wood and sveiping (bending thin wood (2 - 5mm) around a form), sewing jackets and headwear – branch weaving, spinning and twisting yarn – bark or roots used e.g. for sewing in sveiping – sewing nappa leather or fur skin - splitting, spinning and twisting tendons – mica stone. S/he

- has competence relating to assessment and production of duodji products and to choosing tools for the various activities
- has knowledge of ICT, health, safety and the environment and sound financial operations, calculating prices, direct customer contact, sales and marketing to retailers and wholesalers
- is qualified to select, store and process materials such as leather, textiles, horn, bone, birch root threads, bark, wood, metals, iron, pearls and tin
- has knowledge of indigenous Sami history, terminology and culture and is qualified to combine this with artistic skills and creativity when working

The final on-the-job training in a company comprises:

- compulsory modules totalling 1: Design, 2: Establishing a business, 3: Business economy studies- elective modules totalling: 4: Textile sewing production in duodji, 5: Knitwear, woven, braided and twist products, 5: Leather preparation and sewing leather, 7: Metal, bone and horn products, 8: Woodwork products.

The holder of this document also has skills on the upper secondary school level in Norwegian, English, mathematics, natural science, social studies and physical education. Adult students may in some cases be exempted from the requirement for these common-core general studies subjects.

Additional information The first two years of the training take place in a school/training centre. This comprises a total of 19 periods per week in general studies subjects, 47 periods per week in specialised subjects and four periods per week in elective subjects. This is followed by one year of training in a school or company, and finally one year of value creation in a company. Adult students may in some cases be exempted from the requirement for the general studies subjects.
